ON 28 September more than 2,000 members of this Association will assemble in Detroit, Michigan, to participate in the 86th General Conference of the NGAUS. The five business sessions of the Conference and the Annual States Dinner will be held in Cobo Hall, Detroit's mammoth Convention Center.

On hand to address our members will be some of the Country's most distinguished military leaders.

The true significance of our General Conferences is not their size nor the caliber of speakers they attract, but the fact that at these gatherings the Association membership expresses its will, and this expression becomes the base upon which are developed the programs that then are implemented by the officers and the staff operating in Washington.
