At the Cold War's end, the global future is being debated. At the center of that debate is the future of NATO and what its impending expansion means to United States national security. Last fall a delegation of American dignitaries visited NATO and the three countries being considered for membership—Hungary, Poland and the Czech Republic. Among the group were Maj Gen Edward J. Philbin (ret.), the NGAUS executive director, and Barry Jacobs, the assistant director of International Affairs at the American Jewish Committee, who's essay is a strong argument for NATO expansion.
