

In 1993 Congress appropriated \$10 million to implement the Virtual Training Program (VTP). This program, designed to provide realistic training from the individual to the brigade level, was established at Fort Knox Kentucky, the home of Armor. With more than 200 simulators, the VTP has revolutionized the way that the National Guard and active Army prepare for real world contingencies and made Fort Knox the East Coast hub for simulation training.

The California National Guard has been involved with counter-drug efforts along the United States' border with Mexico for more than four years. Among the operations that the California Guard conducts in conjunction with federal authorities are the operation of listening and observation posts along the border. Manned by three or more Guard members at a time, these well camouflaged positions are equipped with state of the art observation equipment. This equipment is used to identify and apprehend drug traffickers before they deliver their poison to American markets.
