

A freight train loaded with highly explosive propane derailed and caught fire in Weyauwega, Wisconsin. In response to the emergency the town's residents were evacuated from their homes. What many thought would be a short-term evacuation stretched into days and Weyauwega's citizen's began to worry about the safety of their homes and pets. Worry turned to grave concern as townspeople waited anxiously for the safe return of their pets. Realizing the importance of calming the fears of the local citizens, Governor Tommy Thompson called on the Guard.
